Law has been taught since 1667.

There are judges of the Constitutional Court and renowned public dignitaries among the teachers of the Faculty.

Diplomas issued by the Faculty are valued at home and abroad.

The Faculty has done well in rankings in excellence of teachers and students and awards at the National Competition of Students' Research Societies.

BRIEF HISTORY

It was a milestone in the history of the University when in 1667 the combined estates of Imre Lósy and György Lippay, both of them cardinals and archbishops of Esztergom, were used to found the Faculty of Law. Alongside canon law and Roman law, emphasis was placed on teaching Hungarian substantive law and procedural law. Tenets of jus commune were taught expressly to rectify the shortcomings and crudeness of domestic jurisprudence at the time. The teaching of Hungarian law began in 1672 at two departments. The subject of the theory of Hungarian law included Hungarian substantive law and the practice of Hungarian law included the law of legislation. Until the Ratio Educationis was issued (1777), tuition took place at five departments: the Department of Roman Law, the Department of Canon Law (both of them operated right from the beginning), two departments where Hungarian law was taught and the Department of Natural Law.

A new curriculum was introduced in the wake of the Ratio Educationis. In addition to the tenured instructors, so-called extraordinary instructors could be hired to ensure the teaching of new subjects. The instructor of Roman law had to teach criminal law as well; and the instructor of Hungarian law had to teach, among other things, statistics about the countries of Europe and principles of Hungarian public law. Efforts were made to establish a department of the history of Hungarian law but Empress Maria Theresa refused permission. With time the assortment of subjects multiplied. The majority of the new subjects were proposed by the Court in Vienna, but the study of Hungarian law and the history of Hungarian law also developed with some delay. There was no direct correspondence between the number of subjects and departments as some professors taught three or even four subjects. Once a subject managed to gather a strong following, the related department was soon to be set up. By the twentieth century it had become established practice that programmes taught as majors had a department of their own in all cases.

Today the Faculty has 15 departments, the Center for Theory of Law and Society and the Institute of Political Sciences. The Faculty of Law trains Juris Doctors and a relatively smaller number of political scientists, public administrators and criminologists.

ADDENDUM TO THE PRICE MEDIA LAW MOOT COURT COMPETITION RULES 2020/2021 COMPETITION YEAR – EXTRACT –

- e) Each team shall have thirty (30) minutes to present their arguments with an additional three (3) minutes for rebuttal and sur-rebuttal respectively.
- f) The Applicant is forbidden from making new legal arguments in the rebuttal and may only respond to arguments raised by the Respondent in the course of the main pleadings. The Respondent team may only use their sur-rebuttal time if the Applicant team exercises its right to rebuttal. The sur-rebuttal must respond only to the points that the Applicant makes during the rebuttal.
- g) Each team may divide its thirty (30) minutes between the two oralists provided that no oralist is allocated less than ten (10) minutes or more than fifteen (15) minutes for the oral pleadings. This must be communicated to the Bailiff at the start of the session, before the round begins.
- h) The order of the pleadings in the Virtual Round of the Competition will be: Applicant 1, Applicant 2 and then Respondent 1, and Respondent 2, and the Applicant rebuttal speaker followed by the Respondent sur-rebuttal speaker.
- i) Only two (2) team members shall present the arguments during an Oral Round on a team's behalf.
- j) The judges are empowered to intervene with questions during the presentation of Oral Pleadings.

JUDGES



Dr. Boglárka Benkó

holds a master's degree in law from Eötvös Loránd University, a Master in Human Rights from the University of Strasbourg and a Master of European Law from the College of Europe (Bruges). Before joining the Registry as a lawyer of the European Court of Human Rights in 2012 she worked at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Hungary as Desk Officer for International Organisations and at the OSCE Mission to Bosnia and Herzegovina as Human Rights Officer. She was election observer for number of EU/OSCE election observation missions. Her previous work experience also includes working as a lawyer at a non-governmental organization representing persons with disabilities.

Dr. Paolo Cavaliere

is a Lecturer in Digital Media and IT Law at the University of Edinburgh Law School, where he teaches courses in telecommunications law, international and European media law, freedom of speech, and digital government at both undergraduate and postgraduate level. Further to his academic activity, Dr. Cavaliere is admitted to the Bar in Italy (non-practising) and has provided expertise on telecommunications and media law to a range of NGOs and international organisations, including the African Union's Mission to Somalia and the Council of Europe among others.

Dr. Kristina Cendic

holds a PhD in media law, dealing with freedom of expression, defamation and online sphere. She works as a senior researcher at SHARE Foundation and as a field expert in media law and policy at the Faculty of Law, University of Zenica. Dr. Cendic previously worked as Annenberg Local Program Coordinator and managed media law and policy activities within the project in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Prof. Dr. Tim Corthaut

teaches Legislative theory and techniques at the Vrije Universiteit Brussel (VUB) and EU law at the University of Vienna. He serves as auditor at the Belgian Council of State. He analyzes in this framework draft legislation on its conformity with higher norms of national, international and EU law, specializing in energy, media and health law and all issues of EU constitutional law and EU trade law (including Brexit). He obtained his LL.M at Harvard Law School and his PhD on "EU ordre public" at KU Leuven, supervised by Prof. Dr. Koen Lenaerts, president of the ECJ, with whom he is currently working on a new textbook on EU constitutional law.

Dr. hab. Ewa Joanna Galewska

holds the position of Professor at the Centre for Legal and Economic Issues of Electronic Communications of the Faculty of Law, Administration and Economics of Wroclaw University. She specializes primarily in European law, International law and law of new technologies. She has published extensively in Polish and English. She has gained research experience at leading European universities and was involved in many research projects of international dimension. She is an active legal advisor and runs her own law firm.

Prof. Assis. Dr. Péter Gárdos

is an assistant professor at the Department for Civil Law at Eötvös Loránd University and a partner at Gárdos Mosonyi Tomori Law Office in Budapest. He specialises in contract law, banking and finance and company law with a special focus on litigation and arbitration relating to these fields. He regularly acts as arbitrator in the Hungarian Commercial Court of Arbitration. He was involved in the preparation of the new Hungarian Civil Code. He is the co-editor and the co-author of the commentary to the new Civil Code published by Wolters Kluwer. He regularly publishes articles primarily in the field of contract law. He is the author of a book on the law of assignment and the editor of a book on fiduciary securities.

Dr. Prof. Assis. Marko Jurić

is an assistant professor at the Information Technology Law department of the University of Zagreb, Faculty of Law. He regularly works as a legal expert in the field of cybercrime, data protection and communication privacy law. Since 2012 he has worked on multiple project activities for the Cybercrime Programme Office of the Council of Europe. He has also worked as an expert for Fundamental Rights Agency of the European Union, European Judicial Training Network and Geneva Centre for Security Sector Governance. He regularly advises Croatian companies and governmental bodies on the implementation of data protection laws and policies and was one of the authors of Croatian cybersecurity strategy.

Dr. Miklós Klenanc

is an attorney-at-law and mediator working in cooperation with Réti, Várszegi & Partners Law Firm PwC Legal Hungary. He is fluent in Hungarian, English, Serbian and Croatian. He is focusing particularly on dispute resolution, including non-conventional legal remedies (requests for a preliminary ruling of the Court of Justice of the European Union, constitutional complaints, applications at the European Court of Human Rights, etc.) and ADR, and liability issues, including those related to Al. He holds an LL.M. in comparative constitutional law with EU specialization from Central European University. Between 2017-2020 he was the Hungarian national representative of the International Association of Young Lawyers (AIJA). In 2019 he was appointed to be the president of the Youth Committee of the Hungarian Law Society.

Prof. Dr. Willem F. Korthals Altes

was a Senior Judge in the District Court of Amsterdam until his retirement on January 1, 2020. He joined the Dutch judiciary in 1995 and also served at the Appellate Court of Arnhem. After working as an attorney-at-law Mr. Korthals Altes moved to academia following two years of study and research at New York University. He spent one year as an Assistant Professor at the Institute of Social Studies in The Hague and in 1985 joined the Faculty of Law of the University of Amsterdam, where he specialized in media and telecommunications law. In 1989, he took his PhD at the University of Amsterdam on the basis of a dissertation on the journalists' privilege of confidentiality of sources. He has published numerous articles, both in The Netherlands and abroad. In 1992, Mr. Korthals Altes became a Visiting Professor at New York Law School, where he taught European Media Law and European Criminal Law. He has also acted as an instructor in many seminars and trainings on freedom of the press for judges, lawyers, and journalists in so-called transitional democracies. He has been a judge (since 2009) and a coach of a University of Amsterdam student team (from 2016 to 2019) at the Monroe E. Price Moot Court Competition.

Dr. Andrea Kovács

graduated from the Faculity of Law of Eötvös Loránd Tudományegyetem in 2019 and is currently a PhD student. Her research focuses on social media regulation. She specializes in IT/IP law as well and currently works as a junior licensing consultant in Budapest. She was a member of ELTE's team in Monroe E. Price Media Law Moot Court Competition in 2018.

Dr. Krisztina Kusnyér-Gedey

is an attorney-at-law and legal consultant active in the media industry. She worked as a senior legal advisor and head of internal legal department for several major commercial audiovisual media service providers of Hungary for almost two decades, providing legal advice on various matters relating to the broadcasting activity as well as international jurisdiction issues. She was also involved in the major European and Hungarian legal reforms relating to the media industry, advising media service providers and filmmakers. She has represented both media outlets and individual complainants in legal disputes relating to privacy, libel, freedom of expression and copyright issues.

is a Senior Lecturer in the School of Law, University of Edinburgh. His principal areas of interest lie within the various strands of EU law. They include in particular the constitutional and administrative law of the European Union, including comparative constitutional law; the methods and reasoning of the European Court of Justice; the law of the internal market; and competition law, both EU and UK.

Prof. Assoc. Dr. Tamás Lattmann

is an associate professor of the Tomori Pál College in Budapest, and of the University of New York in Prague. Earlier he has worked to the Institute of International Relations Prague and at the Eötvös Loránd University, and spent 19 years with the National University of Public Service(Budapest)beforehisunlawful,politicallymotivateddismissal. His field of expertise is international and European law, with a focus on human rights and humanitarian law, lately on challenges posed by digital technology. He is often engaged in professional consultations assisting military lawyers, government agencies, EU institutions, NGOs or different political parties in legal cases and undertakes voluntary legal assistance activities. He has been one of the independent experts heard by the Venice Commission in 2011, during the debates regarding the new Hungarian constitution. Authored numerous publications and various book chapters and held more than fifty conference talks and presentations during the past years on issues of his fields of research.

Dr. Elena Lazar

is a lecturer at the University of Bucharest, Faculty of Law, at Public International Law and EU Internet Law and also a lawyer in the Bucharest Bar. She is also currently an expert for the EU Commission on migration, asylum, and human trafficking. Her areas of practice as a lawyer consist of human rights, data protection, and data privacy.

Dr. Emese Mező

graduated from Eötvös Loránd University Faculty of Law in 2020 with a summa cum laude qualification. Throughout her studies, she spent one semester at the KU Leuven, where amongst other subjects she studied International and European Human Rights Law. She took part in many competitions, the most outstanding and challenging of which was the Price Media Law Moot Court Competition. She advanced to the top 16 teams in Oxford with her team from ELTE university. Since then, one of her main field of interests is Data Protection Law.

Dr. Matija Miloš

is a post-doctoral fellow at the Faculty of Law, University of Rijeka (Chair for Constitutional Law). He holds a PhD in public law and public administration from the University of Zagreb and an LL.M in Comparative constitutional law (with distinction) from the Central European University. His research and teaching are focused on constitutional theory and freedom of expression is one of his chief areas of interest.

Dr. Zsuzsanna Monori

is a media specialist, media law expert, working at the Institute for Media Studies of the National Media and Infocommunications Authority. After obtaining her law degree she participated in the PhD program at the Faculty of Law of University of Szeged, where she researched the legal practice and regulation of harassment in the Institute of Criminal Sciences. She had her master's degree in media law studies. Dr. Monori's main field of research is online stalking and cyberbullying as a criminal act and protection of the right to privacy by criminal law. Currently, she also focuses on unconventional commercial speech in social media platforms and the legal issues of influencer marketing. Her research interests include the Hungarian and foreign criminal law regulation models of fake news.

Prof. Assoc. Dr. Oriona Muçollari

is a lecturer at Faculty of Law of University of Tirana. Beyond her active participation in many national and international scientific conferences and publisher of many scientific articles, she has realized, as the first author, the publication of two textbooks in the field of human rights and local government, as well as co-author in the field of protection against discrimination, textbook for students of the region, in English language. For several years and on working as a trainer in the field of International Human Rights (Gender balance, Discrimination, Hate Speech, Participation in Democracy, Reproductive Rights), she worked for different international and national institution, such as Council of Europe, UNFPA, Ministry of Education and Ministry of Youth and Sports. Dr. Muçollari is the trainer of students in moot courts in the field of human rights at national and universal level.

Dr. Levente Nyakas

is the Head of Institute of Media Studies of National Media and Infocommunications Authority. His main research area is European audiovisual regulation and policy. He is interested in the problems related to media pluralism, disinformation, the sustainability of the dual media model and in the legal problems generated by new media. He received both his law degree (LLD) and his diploma in communication (MA) from Eötvös Loránd University. He earned his PhD from the Doctoral School of Law and Political Sciences of Széchenyi István University.

Prof. Assis. Dr. Enis Omerović

is an Assistant Professor in Public International Law and International Criminal Law at the University of Zenica, Faculty of Law. Upon graduation from the Faculty of Law in Sarajevo, he completed master studies in International Law at the University of Glasgow (United Kingdom). He gained a PhD in Public International Law at the University of Zenica. He was also educated at The Hague Academy of International Law as well as the Europa Institut of the University of Saarland (Germany). From 2008 until 2012 he worked as a Senior Research Assistant for the Institute for the Research of Crimes againstHumanityandInternationalLawoftheUniversityofSarajevo. In 2018 he was elected as a member of the Legal Committee of the Section of Social Sciences of the Academy of Sciences and Arts of Bosnia and Herzegovina. Currently, he is a Vice Dean for Science and Research at the Faculty of Law of the University of Zenica; an academictrainerforthemootcourtcompetitionsinthefieldofhuman rights and international criminal law; a judge at the Monroe E. Price Media Law Moot Court Competition (Budapest), and at the International Criminal Court Moot Court Competition (The Hague). He is a co-author of the study 'Assessment of Media Development in Bosnia and Herzegovina'.

Prof. Dr. Péter Paczolay

is a sitting Judge of the European Court of Human Rights since April 2017. He was a Professor at the Faculty of Law of Eötvös Loránd University and at the Faculty of Law of the University of Szeged where from 1992 till 2017 he was the Head of the Department of Political Sciences. He served at the Hungarian Constitutional Courtas a chief counsellor, a secretary-general and since 2006 as an elected Judge. He was also the President of the Hungarian Constitutional Court from 2008 until 2015. Between 2005 and 2013 he was a member of the Venice Commission of the Council of Europe and presently is its Honorary President.

Dr. János Tamás Papp

is a media specialist and research fellow at the Institute for Media Studies of the National Media and Infocommunications Authority and a lecturer at Pázmány Péter Catholic University. He graduated from the Faculty of Law of Pázmány Péter Catholic University, where he finished his PhD studies in 2019. His main research fields are freedom of expression and media law, and issues related to freedom of expression on social networking sites.

Dr. Emese Pásztor

holds a master's degree in law at Eötvös Loránd University, specializes in constitutional law and fundamental rights protection (bar exam, 2016; LL.M. - Master in European Human Rights, 2017). Dr. Rozgonyi's recent research and policy work focused on responding to disinformation online addressing human right aspects for the Venice Commission and policy implications as well. Moreover, she explored more closely the regulatory aspects of online platforms and proposed potential regulatory models accordingly. She was also engaged with OSCE Representative on Media Freedom as an expert on Artificial Intelligence and media pluralism.

Dr. Balázs Rudinszky

graduated from Eötvös Loránd University's Faculty of Law where he was a member of the Price Moot team that first qualified for the Oxford International Rounds. He has studied freedom of speech in Hungary, the United Kingdom, and the United States and he wrote a paper on freedom of expression in Turkey. Dr. Rudinszky now works as a Trainee Associate in Bird & Bird's Budapest office, after coming home from Washington, D.C. where he researched – among other topics – the effects of media, disinformation and fake news on societies and elections.
